Explain in 500 words</div><div><p>J.V. M.'s Degree College is affiliated to the University of Mumbai since it's year of establishment i.e. 2001 and has been adhering to all the norms set by the University. The college follows the curriculum designed by the University for all its Courses. It also has a well- planned mechanism of curriculum delivery and a meticulous documentation of the same Curriculum/ Curricula Planning:- During the process of curriculum designing the University invites affiliated colleges to organize workshops or seminars for discussing the draft syllabus with the college teachers of the respective subjects. Our college has been actively involved in organizing such workshops in our college premises for the Navi Mumbai zone. Teachers of the respective subjects diligently attend the syllabus revision workshops and update their knowledge regarding any change of syllabus or curriculum. Curriculum Delivery:- In the beginning of every academic year, timetable is prepared by the timetable committee in accordance with the respective department heads and it is shared with the teachers.. The teachers are allotted with a stipulated amount of teaching load and the time table is shared</p></div></div></div></div>

with them well in advance. The teachers prepare their lesson plans and study material which is shared with the students on regular basis. To improve the grasping of the students in the new academic year, bridge course is conducted to brush up their previous years basic concepts. Certificate courses are also arranged in order to enhance their skill and knowledge. Students' feedback is taken periodically during each semester, which is assessed and then analyzed. The analysis is then discussed with the individual teachers on a one on one basis for further enhancement in the teaching learning process. A hand on experience is a tool to integrate lasting impression of the theoretical knowledge in the minds of the learner.As per the requirement of the course/syllabus students are given field experience by taking them to study tours to industry, banks, parks or zoo and financial institutes. For the courses which require the students to submit dissertations or projects, expert subject advice is provided to them by the teachers. The students also have to face viva related to their project to give them an idea of what is expected of them in industry. The college has always encouraged its teachers to use Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in its teaching process. Our college has also introduced a new certificate course based on "Computer Forensics Investigation and Cyber law" for staff and students. Documentation: The practice of preparation of teaching plan and syllabus completion form signed by the students has been carried out diligently by the teachers. The academic diary completion allows the college to organise the teachers details of teaching load, time table, teaching plan, extension activities, workshops, seminars attended by the teachers, student's attendance, class test and assignment records in one diary. The academic diary is checked and signed by the heads of the respective departments. All this ensures a proper documentation of all the data on a timely basis.

Feedback Obtained

Feedback is a valuable information that can be used in making important decisions for any institution. Effective feedback, both positive and negative, is very helpful as it can motivate any institution to wards improvement and growth . Our college has been prompt in securing feedback about different aspects of the institution. One of the most important aspects is curriculum and academic feedback. This feedback is obtained from certain stake holders such as teachers, students, parents, employers and alumni. A series of questionnaire is prepared for each of them separately taking in their opinion to peruse the syllabus design, it’s employability, skill-enhancement quotient ,and it’s relevance for the day. The questionnaire also attempts to find the volume of content and the possibility of timely completion of the same. The questions also aim at identifying about knowledge content alongside other inputs for overall development. Teachers’ questionnaire asks if curriculum is designed for a clear elucidation of concepts from simple to complex and how much of research impetus is included therein. In the parent’s feedback form, questions are asked pertaining to skills and knowledge acquired by their wards and the employability quotient. Potential employers by way of feedback are asked if inclusion of soft skills are required and whether the curriculum is effective in inspiring innovative thinking among the students once employed. They are also queried if the syllabus is relevant to the times and effective enough to produce empowered entrepreneurs .Alumni questionnaire is framed to enquire if there is a realization of having been holistically developed after passing out. Facts regarding ways and means whereby the syllabus has aided them to pursue higher education or aspire to higher goals professionally is also questioned. The collected feedback is then analyzed and presented to the management, trustees and concerned committees for taking appropriate measures and decisions. The college conducts internal and external audit of finances with the help of external and internal auditors. The audit report of the same is submitted to the college management. On the basis of this report funds are sanctioned to various departments as per their requirement. The audit report plays a very important role in the decision making as ours is a

permanently unaided institution. The overall development and growth of the institution is ensured through the above measures and measuring tools. Measures taken to implement the suggestions on the curriculum are as follows: As per the feedback by employers and teachers, suggestion to include internship as an integral part of curriculum was communicated to Board of Studies the body which frames the university syllabus. As per faculties' feedback more orientation on research based activities and skill- based courses for students were introduced. As concluded by feedback of parents, students were made to interact with HR manager of Service Sector to give them the required exposure to current market scenario.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

To ensure that the students get a better grasp of the concepts , theories or formulae (as the case may be) it is ensured that they are not stuck on book knowledge alone. Hence for that purpose besides teaching along the guidelines of university syllabus they are also guided to study tours as a supplement to their book knowledge. This helps us to evaluate them on various projects and other assignments or practical application in the course of their academic session. . Besides to ensure that students are not left to the last minute preparation of exams either through cramming or some other devious short cut devices, periodical and surprise class tests are held from time to time. In some subjects open book tests are held to facilitate the memorising of certain clauses, laws and billion other acts or multifarious facts.Aptitude and quiz tests are undertaken as a means to ignite a spark of general awareness as well as one’s aptitude . However, we were subject to exception this academic year due to COVID 19 and a complete lockdown of not only education but all the sectors world- wide. Due to this phenomena hitting hard on our faces no regular exams were conducted of semester 2 for students of first year nor that of semester 4 for second year. Following the guidelines issued by the Government of Maharashtra and that of the University of Mumbai students of semester 2 and semester 4 were promoted by default to semester 3 and semester 5 respectively through the carry-over of their marks of previous semester. The final year students appeared for their exams on a new platform with a changed paper pattern. They appeared online answering multiple choice questions. ATKT (Backlog) Examination was conducted through online mode.

Since the beehive of activities through the complex network of personnel in any organisation requires a thorough planning and scheduling to facilitate a smooth functioning and avoid last minute glitches, the institution plans an academic calendar each year. It mentally prepares the entire range of staff members along with students in advance of the upcoming schedule related to academics, meetings, extra-curricular events, co- curricular(semi academic) activities, events etc. Through the calendar it becomes feasible for a particular section or faculty be it Commerce or Science to organise something within their own framework without unnecessary clashes and hitches with the college functions or events at large. The academic calendar covers major events pertaining to academics,staff meetings, conferences or seminars hosted by us,intra and inter college cultural, literary and sports events as well as the list of holidays as per university guidelines. It also mentions orientation and farewell dates for the newly inducted first year and final year students respectively. Our institution has an effective mechanism for maintaining its academic and support facilities. LABORATORIES: Our institution has full time courses in Science and Technology such as Chemistry, Physics, Computer Science and Information Technology. We have well equipped laboratories for each of these course which are updated on timely basis. The respective H.O.Ds prepare the list of the requirement of laboratories and communicate to the Principal. The list of requirements and the estimated cost is put forward by the Principal to the management for approval in the College Development Committee (CDC) meeting. Quotations are received from eligible suppliers and procurement after getting necessary approval. LIBRARY: Our college library has spacious rooms for students and teachers that are used for referencing and reading purposes. It consists of a huge collection of reference books and text books of all subjects. The Library Committee receives requisition of books from all H.O.Ds annually. The committee evaluates the new books required and the requisition is forwarded to the Principal for getting necessary approval from the Management for procurement. SPORTS ROOM: Our college infrastructure includes a sports room for students which has many indoor and outdoor sports provisions. We have an appointed sports teacher who organises sports activities for students throughout the year and also supervises the maintenance of the sports equipment. The Sports committee puts forward their requirements annually to the Principal for the approval from Management and subsequent procurement. COMPUTERS: The College has three well equipped computer laboratories with latest hardware and updated software for the departments of Computer Science and Information Technology .The College Administration section has computers for routine procedures. Computers are provided in every department with internet facility to prepare lecture notes, presentations etc. Requirement for new computers and software is presented to the principal for procurement post approval by the management. CLASS ROOMS: Our college infrastructure provides 33 well ventilated Class Rooms for conducting lectures. Annual classroom timetable is prepared by the time table committee. Each classroom is provided with proper benches, light and fans. The support staff cleans the black boards, floors and benches regularly. The electrician maintains the fans and light systems. Any requirement of a classroom is communicated to the Principal which is then proposed to the management for approval and sanctioning of funds. AUDITORIUM: Our institution has a state-of-the-art auditorium where cultural and other programs are conducted. The concerned department has to give a prior notification of the program to be organised for booking the auditorium in advance. The non-teaching staff maintain

the auditorium. Our campus also boasts of a well furnished Seminar Hall for seminars and conferences. Other miscellaneous infrastructure include Girls Common Room, NSS Room, Counselling Room, Canteen, Music Room, IQAC Room, Conference Room, Legal Cell etc. Purified Water Coolers are fixed at every floor for clean drinking water . Our college follows standard procedures and policies for its maintenance and utilization of all the available facilities. The institution outsources the maintenance of infrastructure through the agency appointed by the Principal and Management.

accomplishes his or her target in spite of the odds. Their victory becomes a matter of pride for us. They can now hope for a better future which otherwise they wouldn't have had access to. Problems encountered: However, the odds against this practice is that it does create some financial strain on our institution since we are permanently unaided. We do not get a penny from sources other than our own earning. In spite of this, we feel deep contentment and satisfaction upon witnessing a student climbing up the social ladder after procuring the much coveted degree. Title : Sensitivity Towards community Objective : The sensitivity so inculcated motivates them to rectify social flaws and even work for the common good of all. Context : They need to graduate from a psychology that is distinctly individualistic to that of exponentially collective. The Students passing out of the institution need to have a much needed sympathy and empathy for the community at large. We are keen that they emerge well grounded, stronger and wiser with a willingness to undertake activities and actions geared towards social welfare. Practice : Empathy and Concern: 1. In order to introduce holistic development among the natives of slum area our students undertook yoga session for their all -round development. The other advantage accrued from this was that they were able to spread the awareness about benefits of yogic practices for which the world vouches. It was necessary to sensitize them about overall positive influence about the same in their lives since many children and others often succumb to diseases due to paucity of funds. It's sad yet true that human trafficking is "still rampant in our country" a practice that's undertaken in hidden little nooks and corners. This vicious practice which if happening in 21 st Century is indeed alarming since it reduces a human to a sub- human state. The person who is being bought or sold is perceived as no more than an animal or commodity and is treated as such in this sorry state of affair. Our students went about sensitizing others about this malady plaguing our world today. In fact, they went about teaching that the basic tenet of a human being is actually to be humane to one and all. 4. Crisis Management: In the wake of this current pandemic raising its ugly head all around, the students undertook a few constructive steps to cordon off the fear, panic and unrest that is bound to happen. a) First and foremost they undertook a Janta Curfew Pledge wherein they made others take vow to remain indoors and follow certain quarantine rules as directed by our Prime Minister. Our young volunteers created an awareness that self imposed isolation or distance was but a major and a necessary step to keep the virus at bay, rather than allowing it to seep in the daily fray. b) Coupled with the above they also sought to create a massive campaign through poster and slogans to intimate people about the grave consequences if infected by the deadly virus. c) Along with the awareness drive a Heartfulness Meditation -cum- workshop was conducted to enhance one's immunity system and keep calm in the face of this global crisis. The workshop introduced certain practices to cope up with the vicious corona plaguing the entire face of earth. It was essential to keep oneself healthy and holistically wise in this case.
